The war in Sudan, which has been going on for over two and a half years, is primarily a conflict between the Sudanese army and paramilitary forces. It is about raw materials and has been exacerbated by the climate crisis and the involvement of foreign actors. The result is devastating and has developed into **the world's largest humanitarian disaster**.

The population is starving, suffering from disease and forced to endure military violence on an enormous scale. Over 30 million people need humanitarian assistance and 14 million people have fled to other parts of the country, or to neighboring countries such as South Sudan, Ethiopia and Egypt.

Fled during pregnancy

Mervat is one of these people. She was three months pregnant when the rebels reached her hometown, looting houses, kidnapping girls and killing men who tried to defend their families.

"There was no water and no electricity," says Mervat.

When Mervat started bleeding, she realized that her unborn son was in great danger.

"Because of the war, I couldn't get to a doctor. The anxiety and pressure I felt was enormous. So we left," she explains.

Together with her three-year-old daughter, she began the trek towards Egypt. For several days, they survived on only dates and water.

Once they reached the border with Egypt, they were received by <u>Act Sweden's</u> local partner organization BLESS. They ensured that Mervat received care and medication. A few months later, she was able to give birth to her son – who survived against all odds.

Mervat and her children are now living safely in Egypt. They receive support with food and livelihood while she looks for work. Through the church, she also receives conversational support to process her experiences. This was financed, among other things, by private donations to Act Swedish Church.

In Sudan, fighting and abuse continue, and Mervat's story is just one of millions. Behind every number is a person fighting for their survival, in a reality that is difficult to accept.

Act The Church of Sweden's support reaches

Together with its partner organizations, Act Church of Sweden supports those affected by the war in Sudan.

The first phase involves reaching out with food packages and clean water. People who have fled also receive cash support to buy the most essential things, and families in refugee camps are given a roof over their heads and safe places for their children to play.

People who have fled to neighboring countries receive healthcare, psychosocial support and protection. Children's right to education is a priority, as is reducing the risk of gender-based violence.
